

**ISBR Mentored Summer Grant Writing Program  
for Research in the Social Sciences  
Summer 2007**

For the past five years, ISBR has hosted a Mentored Summer Grant Writing Program. This program offers one month of summer salary for early-career researchers to expand skills in successful research grant writing or for mid-career researchers to further develop their grant writing and technical skills in one of the social sciences. Participants will be provided with individual mentoring as they proceed through the process of developing a grant proposal. A well-developed research idea is a pre-requisite to participation in the program.

Participation in the ISBR 2006 Mentored Summer Grant Writing Program is open to ISU tenure-track faculty and Professional and Scientific staff in the social sciences who: a) are eligible to serve as principal investigators; and b) wish to collaborate with researchers at ISBR. Although the program is geared towards junior faculty, mid-career researchers who demonstrate excellent potential for successful grant writing are also encouraged to apply. Funding is available to support one month of 2007 summer salary for two faculty or P & S staff members. Office space, a computer, and telephone at ISBR will be provided.

**This year, one or more additional slots may be available through the Vice President for Research's New Faculty Grant Development Award. Faculty who joined the ISU faculty after July 1, 2002 are eligible and must apply separately for both programs. The application for the New Faculty Grant Development Award is due February 28<sup>th</sup>.**

Participants are expected to complete a grant proposal during the summer of 2007, prior to the beginning of the Fall 2007/08 semester. At least two faculty members with a successful history of external grant funding will provide consultation and detailed feedback on successive drafts as the proposal is developed. After submission, if the grant is not funded initially, mentoring will be provided throughout the revision process. It is expected that grant applications developed through this program will be submitted through ISBR. The individual's academic department and college will receive recognition if the application is funded. If the faculty or staff member leaves Iowa State University, it is expected that the grant will remain at ISU, if possible administratively.

Priority will be given to faculty and staff who have completed formal training in grant-writing skills, although **this is not a requirement**. Priority also will be given to faculty and staff whose area of expertise is represented among current ISBR researchers or whose research area will extend current initiatives at ISBR. This includes, but is not limited to, topics in:

- Child and family dynamics, aging, mental health, delinquency, health psychology, close relationships, applications of social science theories to social problems, family demography, family economics, rural poverty, rural community development, and related topics.

Applications will be evaluated by a committee of scientists from ISBR and representatives from the applicant's college. Evaluation criteria center on the probability that the project will lead to external funding. More specifically, evaluation criteria include the significance, innovation, and methodological rigor of the proposed project and the quality of the applicant's research record to date (considering the applicant's rank and seniority). Applicants will be asked to submit a description of the project they would like to develop during the summer and a current vita.

**Applications are due March 8, 2005.**

**Applicants will be notified of the outcome of the ISBR review process by April 23, 2007.**

Project descriptions may be no longer than 5 pages (double-spaced) and should include the following sections:

- Specific Aims (specific research questions or hypotheses to be tested)
- Project Justification (selected background literature)
- Research Methods (procedures that will be used to address the research questions)
- Submission Plan (agency, and, if relevant, institute to which the grant will be submitted, with funding mechanism, e.g., small grant, B/START)
- Program of Research (future research directions and potential for continued external funding).
